On May 24, we celebrate the Feast of Our Lady of the Way, an invocation of Our Lady that allows us to remember the entire Ignatian family and all people who are on the move.

Like St. Ignatius first, and Father Arrupe later, we want to pray to this Virgin to place with her Son all our brothers and sisters who are displaced from their homes due to violence, persecution, or natural disasters.

OUR LADY OF THE WAY

As St. Ignatius worked to establish the Society of Jesus, he would pray before the late medieval mural of Mary, which was originally on an external wall of the small chapel of Santa Maria della Strada (Our Lady of the Way) in Rome.

Ignatius would have known the image well and, throughout his life, had a particular devotion to Our Lady under whose patronage he placed the Society of Jesus. The small chapel of Madonna della Strada was demolished to make way for the Church of the Gesù, the first Jesuit church in Rome, which was begun in 1568 and consecrated in 1584.

Ignatius left specific instructions that the image of Our Lady of the Way was to be preserved in the new church and today it is venerated in the north chapel of the Gesù.



To celebrate the Feast of Our Lady of the Way, we invite you to take part in a prayer service during which we will remember the journey undertaken by those forced to move.

At each stage of the journey we will be able to listen to a brief testimony and light a candle as we join in prayer with the entire community.

STAGE 1

We begin this journey alongside those who are suffering from war, hunger, inequality, natural disasters, human rights violations, or persecution. In 2024, UNHCR identifies that over 123 million people have been forcibly displaced.

STAGE 2

The routes that people on the move must choose are not always safe. On foot, by boat or train, they put their lives and those of their families at risk on their way to a second chance. The number of people who have lost their lives on different migration routes has increased by 2% in the last year, according to the International Organization for Migration.

STAGE 3

Often people who have been forcibly displaced find themselves living in shelters, refugee camps and urban areas for months or even years before they are able to return to their places of origin, reach their final destination or be resettled. In 2023, JRS served 1.2 million people through its programs in 58 countries.

STAGE 4

Refugees, asylum seekers or forced migrants must start from scratch upon arrival at their destinations, more than 73% live in low- and middle-income nations according to UNHCR. Upon arrival they must regularize their status, find work and housing. Inserting themselves into communities with their norms and cultures to get used to, dealing with grief and feelings of loneliness, getting used to unfamiliar spaces and faces that will take time to become friendly.
